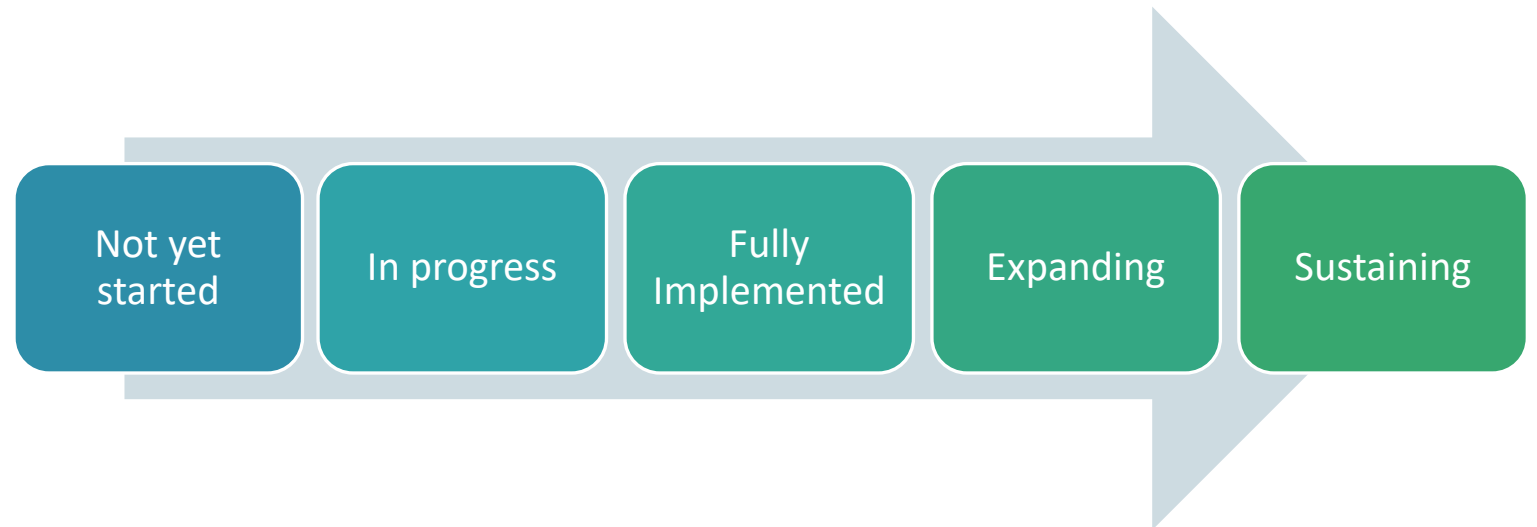

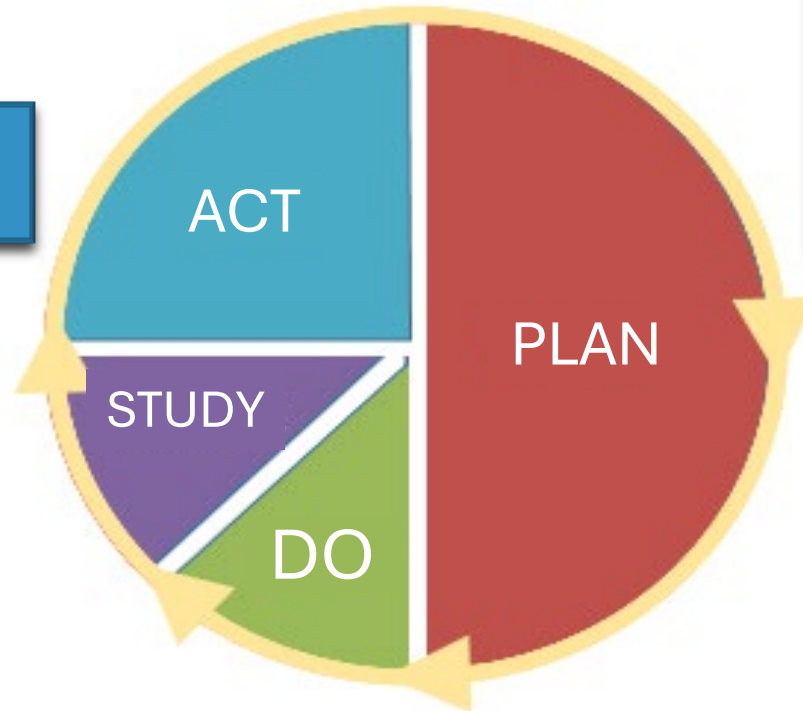

Systematic Approach to Quality Improvement

PLAN - DO - STUDY - ACT

- **Act based** on what you learned
- Adopt, Adapt, Abandon

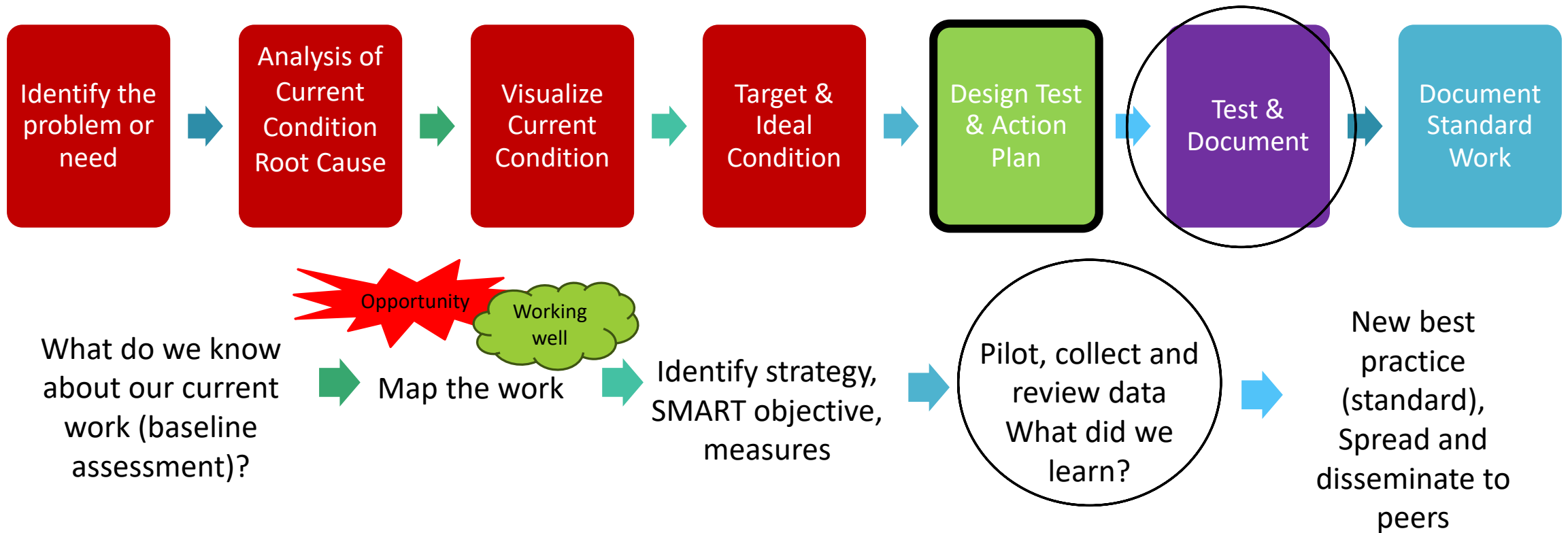
- Review the test
- **Analyze results**
- Assess learnings



- Identify your goal
- Understand the **current state**
- Design experiment/interventions
- Identify metrics
- Predict results

- Test the change
- Carry out a **small-scale experiment**
- Collect data

QI Project Plan Framework



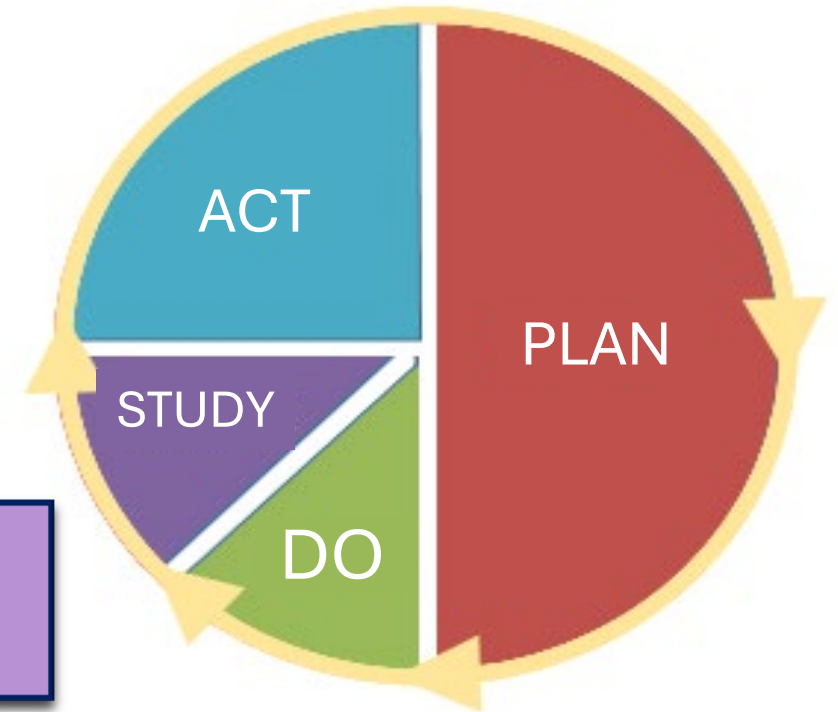
Systematic Approach to Quality Improvement:

Study and Reflect

Did your results align with your hypothesis for the target condition?

Should you continue monitoring the action plan as is or revise the plan?

- Review the test
- Analyze results**
- Assess learnings



Key Elements to Study

Healthcare Team

- Who is providing UMWS patient education
- Frequency of UMWS patient education
- Comfort level in providing UMWS education materials and explaining it to patients
- Timing of UMWS patient education
- Barriers to providing UMWS patient education

Key Elements to Study

Patient and Family

- Comprehension of educational materials and related explanation
- What would make it easier to understand?
- Timing of education – how can this be improved?
- Knowledge of what to do if a patient experiences UMWS
- Comfort level in advocating for themselves or the patient (if partner or other support person)

Ideas for Conducting Staff Pulse Checks

Consider how you will collect your data:


- Integrate question related to implementation of UMWS patient education into **huddle**
- Brief, anonymous **survey** via QR code
- Physical **documentation** – whiteboard, sticky notes, etc.
- Start small to **learn and scale**- ‘one patient, one area at a time, one part of the process’

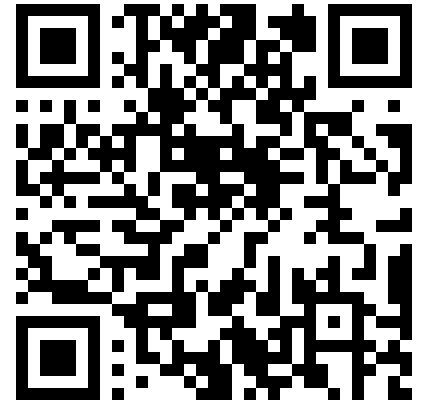
